Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS) On Thursday and Friday, April 4–5, 2025, the Japan-America Society of Washington DC (JASWDC), in partnership with the Edwin O. Reischauer Center for East Asian Studies, welcomed 20 schools, 43 teams, and 123 students from across nine states and one U.S. territory to compete in the 33rd National Japan Bowl, held at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS) in Washington, DC. They were joined their teachers, chaperones, and observers for two exciting days of competition, cultural exchange, and community. Students faced more than 80 challenging questions and a dynamic Conversation Round, with the top–scoring teams advancing to the Day 2 Championship Rounds to determine this year's national champions.

For the past 32 years, JASWDC has organized the Japan Bowl to recognize and encourage high school students across the United States who have chosen Japanese as their foreign language of study. The National Japan Bowl—America's premier Japanese-language competition—plays a vital role in inspiring young language learners and reinforcing their teachers and school districts' efforts and investments.

JAPAN BOWL REPORT





The Japan Bowl is more than just a competition. It offers students a unique opportunity to experience Japanese culture firsthand and to connect with peers who share their passion for Japan. Between competition rounds, students took part in live cultural workshops, including kendama, calligraphy, and karuta. Teachers and students also participated in the "Opportunities in Japan" fair with university representatives, cultural organizations, and sponsors highlighting pathways for language learning, study abroad, and future careers.

The top winners of the 33rd National Japan Bowl will travel to Japan for a week of cultural immersion, including student exchanges, a homestay, and an audience with Her Imperial Highness Princess Takamado, the competition's honorary patron.

Events like the National Japan Bowl not only motivate students to pursue language study but also build enduring bridges between the U.S. and Japan—one student at a time.





Did the event leave a memorable impression on you?




Would you like to come back to the National Japan Bowl next year?




If you had to "do it all over again," would you still choose to study Japanese?


